



Our Culture Playbook

Oregon City Schools introduced Focus 3 concepts to students in grades K-12 during the 2022-2023 school year. Focus 3 is a way to teach students specific behaviors to improve relationships and have our students achieve better relationship outcomes. The core concept is **Event + Response =** Outcome... E+R=O. Each student received a wristband with these three letters on it. The letters are a reminder that each person controls their behavioral Response to Events that happen in their lives. This program emphasizes a controlled/disciplined response as the appropriate response, not our typical reactionary/emotional responses, and is designed to help students get positive Outcomes in difficult situations. It addresses the overwhelming need to help students learn how to handle social media and peer interactions without escalating the situations.



Class of 1973 - 50th Reunion "Crystal Class"

The Crystal Class of 1973 held their 50th reunion gathering May 26-27. The weekend began with a tour at Clay High on Friday afternoon, then a gathering for dinner at the Black Forest Café. Saturday's reunion event at Oak Shade Grove had an incredible turn out and was attended by 176 in total.





Ten acres of land was purchased in 1936, and the new school was built by the start of school in 1937 at a cost of \$120,000, replacing the (10) one-room schoolhouses in the township. Glenn Mills was the first principal of Jerusalem Consolidated School, serving K-8th grade students that lived in the township that the school was named after. Enrollment at that time was 340 in

grades K -8. Continued growth in the region increased the need for classroom space. In 1948, six classrooms, a cafeteria and storage room were added, and in 1955, an additional eight classrooms were added. High school students attended Clay High School in neighboring Oregon Township through a partnership

between the Jerusalem Board of Ed and Oregon Board of Ed until 1958. A new law enacted in 1960, changed the formula for funding public education going forward, requiring a district to have its own high school. Since Jerusalem Consolidated did not have its own high school, they would lose state funding to send high school students to Clay. Therefore, in 1957-58 the two systems became one to serve Oregon Township and Jerusalem Township students. Today, Jerusalem enrollment is 420 for grades K-4, with Mr. Jeff Straka as Principal.



Starr Impact Grant - Whole School Book Project: Wonder

Starr received an OSF IMPACT Grant to help fund the school-wide book project with "We're All Wonders" by RJ Palacio. Wanting to find a way to address the mental health concerns that are affecting students today, the idea for



Clay Culinary Arts Grant – Food Truck Face-Off



Grant for \$3,600 to fund the infrastructure for a more portable, sustainable, lightweight version of the simulated "Food Trucks". Other Career Tech classes were also involved in the re-design process; Engineering Design, Construction Trades, Integrated Machining, Auto and DECA. A HUGE collaborative effort that paid off tremendously.





The Annual Food Truck Face-Off project was invented to encapsulate many learning standards as well as industry standards for the students. Culinary math, menu development, product inventory, marketing, budgeting, accountability, entrepreneurship, and so much more are all be a big part of each team's learning outcomes. Students also gain industry experience hours that are needed for completion of the Culinary Arts program and competition hours that are needed for state reporting. This competition has also proven to be a networking resource for students to meet other business owners and industry professionals.

OCS Year-end Cash Balances - Days Worth of Expenses




