## Superintendent's Message the state of oregon city schools!

With the new year starting, I would like to share the current state of our school system.
OCS is thriving in so many areas right now. Regarding our financial condition, OCS has a positive FiveYear Forecast with strong cash balances through the 26-27 school year. We have worked hard to reduce operational expenses and adjust personnel costs supporting educational programs. The future is never certain related to school funding, but for now we are stable. I am very proud of our athletic culture and
 increased participation throughout our 7-12 sports programs. We value the importance of quality coaching, sportsmanship, and positive sideline behavior. Athletic department leaders are taking a focused approach to ensuring these values are upheld so the student-athlete and fan experiences bring positive memories.

OCS students are achieving academic excellence. We provide something for everyone throughout the district. Our state report card is strong, our career-tech programs are growing, and our curriculum continues to adjust to better meet the needs of today's students. We have a strong veteran Board of Education and administrative team working with a dedicated group of teachers and support staff.

Finally, we are raising more private funds than ever before through our Oregon Schools Foundation. Business and alumni outreach is thriving. OCS has many, many positives, but there continue to be challenges. The district received Federal ESSER funds which helped offset the budget for several years. These funds will no longer be available after this year. The district may have to come to the voters for additional operating funds at some point in the next five years.

Facilities are aging and continued investment into facilities are necessary. Items like roofs, asphalt, bleachers, stadium repair, and general school repairs are extremely costly. We are tackling these items, but they are beginning to add up. Taking care of our students and families is now the expectation.

Not only are we required to teach core academic subjects, but OCS now provides medical care, mental health care, basic clothing and hygiene care, and support for community services. We have embraced this new role, but resources are tough.

Finally, the political landscape has shifted away from overall support of public education to criticism and increased regulation. This is resulting in a significant reduction in available Ohio certified teachers and administrators. The applicant pools are very low whenever we have an opening and this may ultimately affect academic performance. Teaching is a great profession and we need more parents to encourage it.

We are blessed to have strong community support. Districts with low drama and strong support do well.
We have one of those districts. Happy New Year!

On November 8, Clay's Honors American Government students visited the Ohio Statehouse to learn about the state capital and state government.

Ms. Stevens has had a love of the sport since she first learned to shoot in her backyard at the age of nine. She teaches archery as part of the physical education classes at Ike. That part of the class had become so popular that Ms. Stevens decided to create the club. Stevens has been
leading the club at Ike for more than a decade, and was trained by the National Archery in Schools Program (NASP). A grant was filed to purchase the equipment to be used in physical education classes. One strict rule Steven enforces is that students must learn and pass a test on the NASP 11 steps to archery success and all of the safety protocols before being allowed to shoot. Students aim to have their
picture displayed on the "Bullseye Wall of Fame" in the Ike gymnasium The display features students' first archery bullseye. As far as the benefits of archery, Stevens said, "It takes a lot of focus, concentration and patience. It is good for self-discipline and responsibility. Some of the kids are really good. I have had students who have pursued it. I teach NASP scoring and competition rules because there
are some kids who compete in the spring in the Arnold Classic in Columbus." Archery Club is just one opportunity for involvement at Ike. The school offers many other opportunities for students to get involved, including being a part of the yearbook staff, Youth to Youth Club, The Soaring Times newspaper staff, Student Council, Fitness Club, Tennis Club and the Junior Limelighters.

A student representing Oregon City Schools recently received a perfect score in the first of meets in this year's WordMasters Challenge ${ }^{\mathrm{TM}}-\mathrm{a}$ national vocabulary competition involving nearly 125,000 students annually. Competing in the Gold Division of the WordMasters Challenge ${ }^{\text {TM }}$, fourth grader Grace Bickford earned a perfect score of 20 on the challenge. Nationally, only 47 fourth graders achieved this result. Other students from Oregon City Schools who achieved outstanding results (only missing one) in the meet include fifth graders Carter Clark and Amyah Ibarra. Grace was coached in preparation for the WordMasters Challenge ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ by Mrs. Robin Sneed at Jerusalem Elementary. Carter and Amyah were coached by Mrs. Amy Bittel at Eisenhower Intermediate School. The WordMasters Challenge ${ }^{\mathrm{TM}}$ is an exercise in critical thinking that first encourages students to become familiar with a set of interesting new words (considerably harder than grade level), and then challenges them to use those words to complete analogies expressing various kinds of logical relationships.
